A Note From Trish

Dear Reader,

At the very beginning of A WEALTH OF DECEPTION antique and art dealer, Edie Brown, tells about reluctantly creating a memory box after the death of her beloved grandparents:

"When I was seventeen, my grandparents died in a plane crash. A single-engine plane. Within sight of our house. The therapist suggested I create a memory box dedicated to them. I didn't tell her I'd already declared the field where they went down a living memorial, at least in my mind. Instead of opening my heart, I bristled and did as she asked, gluing photographs, newspaper articles, and other odds and ends into the craft store box she provided. Then I closed the box's lid and scrawled orange and red flames on the outside, crayons snapping under the ferocity of my grip."



Despite her general dislike for the therapist and aversion to the project, creating the memory box has a profound influence on her life, not only helping her through the traumatic loss but instilling in her a sense of empathy toward others suffering from horrific and life-altering experiences.

Later in the novel, when Edie discovers a disturbing collage with a questionable provenance, her art therapy experience is a large part of what drives her to untangle the mystery of who really created it.

For me as the author, this interplay between Edie's traumatic backstory, art, and healing made the perfect springboard for the novel's plot. I asked myself, given Edie's past, what type of art or antique related crime would challenge her the most? From there, I developed the emotionally raw collage she discovers. Next I created a cast of troubled characters each with their own difficult story to tell.

Most importantly, I wanted A WEALTH OF DECEPTION to end with an uplifting sense of redemption and that right had triumphed over hardship. In other words, like the process of healing through art therapy, I wanted the story to help Edie and other characters she comes to care about to find their way past trauma and to a place where they can rebuild their lives.

I hope you enjoy this book club kit, which includes discussion questions, an awesome recipe, some photos from my own antiquing adventures, and a conversation with Kala. Thank you for reading, sharing, and reviewing!

Discussion Questions:

The questions below have some spoilers for A WEALTH OF DECEPTION. Please come back to this page after you've finished reading and are ready to enjoy discussion.



- 1-Do you have a favorite character in A WEALTH OF DECEPTION? Have you changed your feelings about any character since reading book one in the series, THE ART OF THE DECOY?
- 2-Most of the towns in the Scandal Mountain Antiques Mystery series are real. However, sometimes locations within those towns are fictional—Checkerberry Assisted Living, Sterling Gallery, The Well-being Center. Did this bother you or did those fictional locations seem real while you were reading?
- 3-Edie defines outsider art as, "...works made by people who live outside the mainframe of society and don't have formal training...". The definition of 'outsider art' and 'folk art' are much debated by professionals in the art world. What do you think separates and defines the two categories?
- 4-If you owned an antique shop and the alarm went off in the middle of the night, would you rush out and confront the intruder(s) or wait for the police to arrive? Do you think Tuck and Edie's reactions fit their characters?

- 5-What do you think about the Lefebvre men? Do you think the complication of Edie and Tristan Lefebvre's relationship as teenagers is something that often occurs in small towns?
- 6-Do you think Vicki Tuckerman's impulsive marriage and surprise pregnancy had an effect on her and Edie's relationship?
- 7-Did you wonder about the extra shoes in Anna Gorin's entryway?
- 8-What did you think was happening when Edie looked through the window at Shane's house and saw the woman? How did you feel about Edie's mistrust of Shane at this point, and again later when she believes he joined the FBI without telling her? Were you surprised when Shane told her the truth?
- 9-What do you think about Jimmy Zaninelli? Is he a good friend to Edie and someone she can trust, or is he a morally gray character?
- 10-Where you familiar with NFTs before reading this book? Do you think they qualify as art?
- 11-Do you think Alder Scranton Meadows should be held responsible for her actions or was she a victim?
- 12-At the end of the novel, Stanislav Volkov donates valuable works of art to the show. Later, Edie gives the painting of Madonna and Child to Erik. Were you surprised by these events, or do you feel they were predictable, given the characters' personalities?
- 13-Were you satisfied by Evita Volkov's fate at the end of the novel?
- 14-What do you think will happen to Erik Volkov in the future? What do you think might have happened if Edie hadn't seen the collage and decided to investigate?
- 15-What mysteries linger at the end of this novel, and what do you think might be resolved in the next book?

I headed downstairs and into the kitchen. Tuck was already up, cotton apron protecting his belly as he pulled a batch of muffins from the oven.


I sniffed the air. "Raspberry and white chocolate?"
